ENTRY OF OUR LORD INTO JERUSALEM. Holy Apostle and Evangelist

Mark (1st c.). Palm Sunday

Philippians 4:4-9 | John 12:1-18

Blessed feast of Palm Sunday! Please take palms and willows to adorn your homes and your icons (please also bring in any remaining palms or willows from last year, so they may be properly disposed of).

The Holy Week schedule is available on the website and also posted in the back of the Church. Those who have volunteered to help do the Old Testament Readings on Holy Saturday morning, please make sure to get your reading from Fr. John before you leave.

Father John is available today following Liturgy, as well as Monday & Tuesday (by appointment or after Matins) to hear confessions. Father will not turn anyone away, but nevertheless would prefer not to hear confessions between Holy Wednesday and Pascha, as the schedule is very full.

Reminder: as Orthodox Christians in good standing, and because “unless you eat and drink” of Holy Communion, “you have no life in you,” faithful parishioners are expected to give confession during the major fasts and to receive Holy Communion. If you have not already done so in some time, prepare yourself for confession and to receive communion. A good rule is this – aim to commune frequently, and confess regularly (there is no exact one-to-one “rule”). Without regular communion we are willing excommunicating ourselves from the Church; we are withholding ourselves from the grace of Christ’s lifegiving body, needed in our spiritual struggle. At the same time, we should approach communion mindfully and with prayerful preparation, fasting, a clear conscience, and if possible attending the vespers/vigil/evening service before the liturgy.

Moving From Lent to Holy Week

Today is the Sunday of our Lord’s entrance into Jerusalem, beginning the week of His Passion...And as we get ready for Pascha, our Lord extends the same invitation to us as He extended to James and John in today’s Gospel: “are you able and willing to drink the cup that I drink from?” To help us prepare to drink from the wellspring of Pascha, here are some suggestions:

Attend the services. There are a number of services during Holy Week. It is through worship that we unite ourselves to

Christ. Holy Week is a single unbroken Liturgy that invites us to participate in, and partake of the saving love of Jesus Christ.

Create silence. Disconnect entirely from television, radio, social media. The world and all your “news”, “friends” and “followers” will still be there after Pascha. Give yourself the space and opportunity to be drawn by Christ more deeply into His words and actions. To hear the “still, small voice” of Christ, we have to silence the relentless cascade of distraction we willingly pump full force into our hearts and minds.

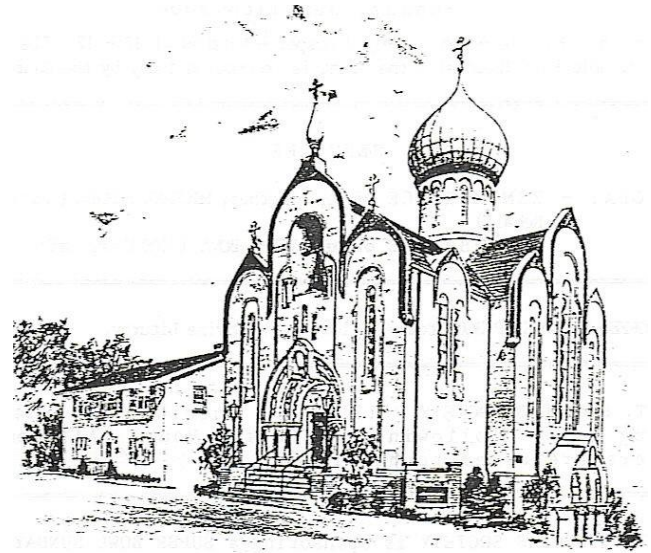
Read a Gospel. Set aside time each day to read several chapters. In the Gospels we do not find words about Christ, we find words from Christ. Each verse of Holy Scripture is a word spoken directly to you by the raised and glorified Lord. Each word is a word for now.

Seek forgiveness and healing. Each of us have relationships in need of healing. Admit your mistakes, and forgive the mistakes made by others. Offer yourself in love to at least one other person from whom you are estranged.

Call someone who is sick or lonely. Visit them if you can. Share yourself with someone who needs you. We are part of the mystical body of Christ, and we are called to a life of unity and communion with one another.

Bright Week and beyond! With Pascha comes the True Light that enlightens the whole world. The radiance of Pascha changes everything. Each Sunday is a Pascha, thus each week is a Holy Week. Holy Week and Pascha are the models for every week of the year. Jesus Christ touches all of time through the Cross, and all of time collapses into the eternal now of His divine love.

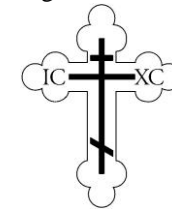
May we live all of life in the light of the Resurrection!
